Martin Pearlman studied harpsichord on a Fulbright Grant to Amsterdam with the great harpsichordist and early music pioneer Gustav Leonhardt, who was one of his major musical influences. He then went to Yale, where he worked with the noted harpsichordist Ralph Kirkpatrick.
